

Don't forget your Safety Day.

Every employee and member of our local receives a Safety Day each year should you work the entire preceding year without having an accident or injury. For many years if you had a job classification that required you to work in the field and not in an office setting you would get one day per year. Through the help of the local's Safety Recognition Committee a few years ago, all employees were given the opportunity to earn a Safety Day each year, regardless of their classification. So, whether you worked in the call center or Field Services, if your work record reflected no accidents or injuries, you would be eligible for a Safety Day. By earning a Safety Day, you can schedule the day off as you choose with pay as a reward and incentive to work in the safest manner that you possibly can.

It's up to you to keep track of your points earned and when you earn a day to use. REMEMBER, the points do expire so you must "use it or lose it". So make certain that you use the day, you earned it! You can see your point totals and all information regarding the

Safety Day by visiting the KCPL Intranet and visiting the Safety section. If you have any questions and if we can help you understand the process let us know or contact your HR Representative. Generally, your steward or a co-worker can also help you understand the process as well.

Local Attends IBEW Organizer Boot Camp

Jerry Archer and Kathy Hibdon recently attended The IBEW Organizer Boot Camp January 23rd thru the 27^{th,} 2012 in Madison, Wisconsin at the University of Wisconsin School For Workers. Martin Luther King on "Right to Work".

"In our glorious fight for civil rights, we must guard against being fooled by false slogans, such as "right to work". It is a law to rob us of our civil rights and job rights. Its purpose is to destroy labor unions and the freedom of collective bargaining by which unions have improved wages and working conditions for EVERYONE. Wherever these laws have been passed, wages are lower, job opportunities are fewer and there are no civil rights. We do not intend to let them do this to us. We demand this fraud be stopped. Our weapon is our vote"

These were Martin Luther King's words speaking about Right-to-Work laws in 1961. As many of us know, when MLK was assassinated he was speaking in support of the Sanitation Workers. Point being, MLK was a supporter of the American worker, the middle class and the American Dream. Here we are some 50+ years later and we as the American worker are watching our rights to collectively bargain slip away. We are under attack, you, me and all of us. We must fight back and not let the politicians who support corporate greed and corporate welfare beat us and strip away what's left of the American Dream.

Indiana in the last week has passed Right to Work for Less legislation. Wisconsin did so last year, by overnight stripping away the rights of public workers across their state. Now, right here in the state of Missouri we will again face off with those in government that want to do the same to us as well. We fought this hard last year, although I am certain most of us had no idea that there was a fight going on and being fought in Jefferson City. Right to Work is not a good thing for any of us reading this newsletter. It only benefits those that are wealthy, those that can't and won't ever be able to relate to the issues that you and I experience everyday in the workplace and in life.

<u>Governor Scott</u> <u>Walker, starring in</u> "Total Recall".

Organizers with United Wisconsin turned in over 1 million signatures to the Government Accountability Board (GAB) to recall anti-worker crusader and Governor Scott Walker. The package weighed more than 3,000 pounds. The signatures represent the largest recall effort in the history of the United States and 185% of the signatures needed to trigger a recall

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of Walker. Kathy and I were fortunate to be in Wisconsin the week that Walker gave his State of the State Address at the Wisconsin Capitol in Madison. Before and during his speech folks occupied the halls and floors of the state capitol chanting anti Walker messages and singing anti Walker songs, written especially for him. As we stood there with nearly every class participant and hundreds of other pro union brothers and sisters, it was truly gratifying and inspiring to see a group of individuals come together and unite for a common cause. Many of these people were part of the protest last year where 150,000 people gathered at the State Capitol in Wisconsin in protest of Scott Walker and his desire to dismantle unions and collective bargaining in Wisconsin. They lived in the halls of the capitol for weeks sending a message of unity and of equality. I think we may have our opportunity right here in the state of Missouri sooner or later. Workers At Chinese Plant Making Apple And Microsoft Products Threaten Mass Suicide-

Workers at a Foxconn plant in Wuhan, China have threatened mass suicide after the company announced they would be denied a pay increase. Foxconn builds electronic products for numerous worldwide corporations, such as Apple and Microsoft, and this plant specifically produces the popular gaming console Xbox 360. The employees were given the option of keeping their jobs without a pay raise or resigning from their jobs and receive compensation in exchange.

Products built in China and shipped back to the United States is not as cheap as it once was. Labor cost is on the rise and fuel costs have cut into corporations' bottom lines in recent years. Hopefully, we will see more work and jobs come back to the United States in the years to come. There were also statistics released that the average American worker in manufacturing produces more than a Chinese worker overseas. Working conditions in some overseas plants and factories are deplorable. I know it's hard to buy everything US made, but every time we buy products made here in America, we create and keep jobs right here on American soil. Again, it's difficult to do, but a conscious effort to buy American products will make a big difference in getting our economy turned around and getting folks back to work.

Who You Gonna call?

From time to time folks don't always get along with one another in the work place. But how you handle your "issue" or dispute is very, very important.

Hopefully, each party is able to rationally discuss their differences and can work through them where each person can perform their duties safely and effectively throughout their day until tensions subside. What happens when two people can't work through their problems? Simply, ask for the union's help in resolving the issue. We are more than happy to assist anyone that is experiencing any type of problem, be it with a co-worker or supervisor or any other issue that could be affecting one's life.

Life is tough sometimes and relationships get strained. But the important thing to remember is to do everything that you can to resolve the issue with the other person without getting HR involved. When HR is involved, generally the outcome is not good and what could have been addressed and corrected without their "help", now turns quickly into a situation where discipline is handed down to one or both parties and often times others that weren't directly involved in the incident to begin with. These "investigations" often times turn terribly wrong and people's lives are negatively affected. Our jobs are watch each other's back's, in the good times and in the bad times. Never help your brother or sisters lose their livelihood. If their actions are putting you or themselves in danger, do what you have to do to keep yourself and them safe. But if you had a spat over something trivial and the situation got temporarily out of hand, step back and take a deep breath and let us help you work the problem out. It's the proper thing to do. Brothers and Sisters should not be in the business of policing one another. We all should be in the business of helping and working with one another.

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
